The peace talks were recessed yesterday without explanation until Dec. 4, after six days of meetings between Henry A. Kissinger, President Nixon's adviser on national security, and Le Duc Tho, a member of the North Vietnamese Politburo who has been the North Vietnamese negotiator in the private talks.

Subcommittee sources said that on Wednesday they received the first intimation that North Vietnam wished to have the visit delayed. This was confirmed Friday in a message

This was confirmed Friday in a message from North Vietnamese representatives in Paris. 12 ~~~~ One of the reasons given, the sources continued, was that the North Vietnamese leaders were now "too busy" to receive the Americans. The subcommittee spokesman said that he hoped the trip could still be made early next year, but that Hanoi had not suggested a specific new date.

The physicians' visit was planned as the result of a letter of invitation from the North Vietnamese Foreign Minister, Nguyen Duc Trinh, to Senator Edward M. Kennedy, Democrat of Massachusetts, the chairman of the subcommittee. The letter

was received here on Aug. 22.
But the State Department opposed the trip before the conclusion of a settlement of the war, and at one point, Secretary of State William P. Rogers told Mr. Kennedy that the visit might interfere with the peace talks.

The medical group was scheduled to leave on the trip on Wednesday, but a spokesman for the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Refugees and Escapees, which was coordinating the project, said today that the North Vietnamese sent word on Friday of their desire for a delay.

Subcommittee sources said that, in as much as the visit was designed to survey the needs for postwar medical relief and rehabilitation in the North and was "geared to the end of the war," they had the "strong impression" that an adverse turn in the Paris peace negotiations last week might have led the North Vietnamese to ask for the delay.
