

HARD LINE IN PARIS HINTED BY HANOI

An Editorial Warns Against
Revision of Agreements

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HONG KONG, Dec. 3—The official North Vietnamese newspaper Nhan Dan warned in an editorial today that any attempt by the United States to revise the Vietnam peace agreements as announced by Hanoi last month would mean that Washington's real intention was to scrap the accord and continue the war.

Coming the day before Henry A. Kissinger, adviser on national security to President Nixon, and Le Duc Tho, Hanoi's representative, are due to resume peace negotiations in Paris, the declaration seemed intended to emphasize the tough stand North Vietnam would take.

The editorial was supported by a statement from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs denouncing recent United States war actions in Vietnam and affirming the determination of the Vietnamese Communists and their allies in Laos and Cambodia "to drive the United States imperialist aggressors out of the Indochinese peninsula."

Broadcast by Hanoi

Both the editorial and the Foreign Ministry statement were broadcast by the Hanoi radio and monitored here.

The editorial said that if the United States sought to revive the Vietnam peace agreements "then its real intention would be nothing other than to scrap all the commitments already made in order to prolong its war of aggression in Vietnam and Indochina."

The newspaper said that the United States would then be held responsible "in the eyes of the world people and the American people" for twice wrecking the chance of restoring peace in Vietnam.

The first time, it said, was four years ago when the United States suspended the bombing of North Vietnam and agreed to take part in a four-party conference in Paris.

The newspaper said that the Nixon Administration was responsible for then dashing "the budding hope of progressive mankind" and for subsequently embarking on the Vietnamization program to impose neo-colonialist rule on Vietnam.

Bombing Assailed

The editorial charged that recent bombings and other war acts of American and South Vietnamese forces attested United States unwillingness to end the war and its determination to make South Vietnam a colony and prolong the division of Vietnam. It said:

"The Vietnamese people, the American people and the entire peace-and justice-loving mankind are demanding that the United States keep to the contents of the agreement on ending the war and restoring peace in Vietnam and sign it without further delay," it said.

The newspaper reiterated the determination of "The Vietnamese people to fight through to the end till the full attainment of our sacred basic national rights" if "the United States aggressors obdurately prolong their savage war of aggression."

Neither the Nhan Dan editorial nor the Foreign Office new, but their timing obviously indicated they were directed at the Paris talks.
