Polish Tell of Attack

WARSAW, Dec. 20 (Reuters)

— A Polish freighter had been sunk and three Polish seamen killed in an American bombing attack on the North Vietnamese port of Haiphong today, the Polish press agency reported.

Five other seamen aboard the freighter, the 5,720-ton Jozef Conrad, were injured, the agency said in a statement announc-

cy said in a statement announcing the protest.

The agency said the responsibility for the "barbarous attack" lay completely with the United States. The Conrad burned and sank, it said.

"This act by the American Air Force, which caused the death of three Polish seamen, qualifies as an act of an air piracy which deserves absolute

piracy which deserves absolute condemnation," the statement declared.

SAIGON, South Vietnam, Dec. 20 (AP) — The Hanoi radio reported today that 215 persons were killed and 325 were wounded in the North Vietnamese capital in raids on Monday and yesterday. In Haiphong, it added, 45 persons were killed and 131 wounded on Monday. were killed and 131 wounded on Monday.
