Haig Visit Spurred Thieu Security Talks

SAIGON, South Vietnam, Dec. 20—Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr. met for half an hour today with President Nguyen Van Thieu. It was General Haig's second meeting with Mr. Thieu since he arrived here yes-

terday.

General Haig was scheduled to leave for Laos at about noon today but put off his departure until 4:30 P.M. after waiting for Mr. Thieu to finish a meeting with his security council that lasted most of the morning.

Neither the American Embassy nor General Haig has made any statement about the content of the discussions.

A quasi-official Vietnamese newspaper, Tin Song, said this afternoon that General Haig had brought a letter from President Thieu.

Kissinger said had been settled between Washington and Hanoi before the United States began the current heavy bombing against the North Vietnamese.

General Haig arrived here from Saigon and Phuom Peuh late this afternoon and was driven directly to the Premier's residence. With him at the conference was the United States Ambassador to Laos, G. Mac-Mustrie Godley.
