

Kosygin Condemns

Resumed U.S. Raids

MOSCOW, Dec. 25—Soviet

Premier Alexei Kosygin said today he "expects" an immediate halt to the resumed U.S. bombing of North Vietnam.

The official Tass news agency said Kosygin received the North Vietnamese ambassador to Moscow and told him the Soviet government "expects that armed actions against the (North) Democratic Republic of Vietnam will be immediately terminated."

Kosygin also urged the United States to sign the cease-fire accord "to restore peace in Vietnam."

There was criticism elsewhere of the renewed U.S. bombing in the north:

• The Yugoslav government

condemned the air strikes, denouncing "the massacre of the civil population, the systematic destruction of cities and merciless devastation of territory by the U.S. air force."

• Prime Minister Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and other Bangladesh leaders said the "indiscriminate" bombing of Hanoi and other civilian centers by U.S. bombers came as a shock to the entire world.

• In London, 200 legislators, clerics, union leaders and actors lined the pavement outside the U.S. embassy in silent protest against the bombing.

• In West Berlin, several hundred demonstrators marched down the city's main street shouting "Nixon murderer."
