

Thousands in Europe Join War Protests

Peaceful demonstrators in Germany, the Netherlands and Luxemburg yesterday, protested the continued war and American bombing in Vietnam.

In Hamburg, Germany, about 2800 demonstrators marched in two separate rallies, police said. More than 1000 people, among them many women and children, took part in one march called by the "Committee for Vietnam," while 1800 rallied about the same time for a protest march organized by the Communist Party, police said.

In Utrecht, the Netherlands, a crowd estimated by police at 50,000 quietly marched through the city

center in a demonstration organized by political parties.

The Dutch Protestant Council of Churches, the Catholic primate Cardinal Alfrink and trade unions and cultural organizations had announced they supported the demonstration.

The demonstrators carried posters saying "Vietnam for the Vietnamese," "halt bombing in the whole of Vietnam," and "Nixon sign peace now."

In the capital city of Luxemburg, 3000 people marched silently through the streets to the U.S. Embassy to urge an end to the Vietnam war.
