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Senators' Mail Runs Heavily

Mail to senators is running ratio of 9 to 1 against the heavily against President Nixon's December escalation of the North Vietnam bombing, according to a Washington Post survey of 32 Senate offices.

Even senators who have been strong supporters of the President's Vietnam policies are receiving volumes of mail opposing the 12 days of unlimited bombing in mid-December. Not a single office reported a balance in favor of the bombing, and only three reported an even split between pro-bombing and anti-bombing letters.

Mail to both Maryland Republican senators has been overwhelmingly critical of Mr. Nixon's policy. Sen. Charles McC. Mathias Jr. has received 3,000 letters opposing the bombing and only 100 favoring it. An aide to Sen. J. Glenn Beall said "Mail is running 8 or 10 to 1 against the bombing."
