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# C.B.S. Gives a Report on Terms of Peace

C.B.S. News reported yesterday that it had gained access to portions of the draft agreement to end the war in Vietnam and gave details of provisions for release of prisoners, troop withdrawal, composition of a control commission and signing procedures.

"The information about the agreement came from usually reliable sources inside South Vietnam's presidential palace,"

C.B.S. News said in a statement.

According to the network's account,

¶All prisoners would be released "within the first few months" after the agreement takes effect, but some would be released the day after signing.

¶United States troops would be withdrawn within 60 days after the signing, but American personnel in Thailand and in

the Seventh Fleet off the coast of Vietnam would be unaffected.

¶An international control commission of 3,000 or 3,100 people from four nations would be constituted to supervise the cease-fire.

¶The four parties to the agreement—North Vietnam, the National Liberation Front, the United States and South Vietnam—will not sign the same document.

The draft agreement was described as a document of slightly more than 60 pages, containing nine chapters and 25 articles, of which 14 are protocols or provisions describing how particular aspects of the cease-fire are to be brought about.

The document was also described as being in Vietnamese and English, and C.B.S. News said that ultimately the four principal parties would signify their acceptance of its terms by signing separate sheets of paper that would be attached to the agreement, rather than by all signing the same document.
