

Pact Reported Set On All Major Points

PARIS, Jan. 16 (UPI) — A Paris-based correspondent for an American newspaper group reported today that Hanoi and Washington have reached agreement on all major points for a cease-fire covering Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia.

Serge Fliegers of the Hearst newspapers said the agreement includes the return of American war prisoners in exchange for North Vietnamese prisoners—held by South Vietnam.

Quoting "an unimpeachable source at the Paris conference," Fliegers said the U.S. would leave Vietnam within six months after the signing of the agreement.

He said the proposed pact:

- Does not mention withdrawal of North Vietnamese troops from South Vietnam, but forbids Hanoi to send new troops into South Vietnam, Laos or Cambodia.

- Reduces the power of the National Reconciliation Council and deletes the terms "administrative structure" and "power structure" from the Oct. 26 draft agreement.

- Outlines agreement for a cease-fire in Laos and Cambodia, but not necessarily at the same time as in South Vietnam.

- Drops all mention of the Provisional Revolutionary Government, the political arm of the Vietcong.

- Provides for re-establishment of a "hermetic" Demilitarized Zone at the 17th parallel.

The dispatch said the agreement speaks of "North Vietnam" and "South Vietnam," and says the two should discuss certain problems.

Fliegers said signing of a peace agreement would not take place in Hanoi, but probably in Paris, and would involve North and South Vietnam, the United States and the Vietcong.

Fliegers said: "There is no indication at present when the agreement will be signed exactly."

In other developments here today, legal and language experts from the United States and North Vietnam met for almost eight hours to work out technical details of the cease-fire.

Both sides said the specialists would get together again Thursday morning in a Paris suburb, while the four delegations to the regular weekly peace talks hold their 174th session in the downtown area.
