

The Viet Cong Look to Politics

The Provisional Revolutionary Government (PRG) has decided to concentrate its 1973 efforts in South Vietnam on the political struggle and "national concord" policy, it was learned yesterday.

The South Vietnamese Communist leaders said their goal is the signing of a peace treaty with the U.S.

In a communique published yesterday in the North Vietnamese party newspaper Nhan Dan, it said it held its first 1973 plenary session January 8 to 10 "somewhere in the South"

under the chairmanship of its leader, Huynh Tan Phat, to "draw up the balance sheet of '72 and outline the orientation for '73.

The communique stressed "the policy of 'national concord' is the one which best "our people's millenary tradition of unity," is "primordial and fundamental for the present and future."

After appealing for the development of "political and military forces" and the consolidation of "the liberated zones and revolutionary power at all levels," the communique said that "the most important thing is to broaden the national union

front, rallying to it patriotic, democratic and pacifist forces" of various tendencies in South Vietnam.

The rallying must be carried out in the face of

"American aggressors and the most warmongering and obstinate agents of the Nguyen Van Thieu clique," the communique said.

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
