

**Thai Chief Is Wary
Of Move on Border
After Vietnam Pact**

BANGKOK, Thailand, Jan. 19 (UPI)—Premier Thanom Kittikochorn said tonight that a cease-fire could be extended to Laos and Cambodia about 10 days after it goes into effect in South Vietnam.

He said he was concerned about the time lapse because as negotiations for a cease-fire have gone on the North Vietnamese have pushed closer to the border of Thailand, particularly in Laos.

The Premier and other ranking Thai officials met here today with Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr. for a briefing on the Paris peace talks. Mr. Thanom said that the cease-fire in Vietnam would come in the near

future and that General Haig was returning to Saigon "because there are some questions still to be worked out."

Laotian Gives View

VIENTIANE, Laos, Jan. 19 (UPI)—Premier Souvanna Phouma said today that he told Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr. that he wants a cease-fire in Laos to follow closely any Vietnam truce agreement to prevent a possible continuation of the Indochina war in his country.

The Premier, in an interview, said he had been assured of enough United States air support to repel any North Vietnamese attack on Laos after a cease-fire in Vietnam. He conferred with General Haig yesterday.

The Premier said he believed that a peace agreement for Vietnam would come in about a month.
