

## Vietcong Say Saigon and U.S. Repeatedly Violate Cease-Fire

PARIS, Feb. 12 (UPI) — The Vietcong side accused South Vietnam and the United States today of repeatedly violating the Vietnam peace agreement and warned that it "will not go on tolerating this."

The Vietcong delegation spokesman, Ly Van Sau, said that the United States had refused to dismantle all its military bases in South Vietnam and that Saigon troops still were launching attacks in zones controlled by the Communists two weeks after the cease-fire agreement went into effect.

Mr. Sau also charged that North Vietnamese and Vietcong military representatives on the joint cease-fire commission were being badly treated and housed in "indecent quarters" in South Vietnam.

"We will not go on tolerating these violations because it would encourage the Saigon administration and lead to the complete sabotage of the Paris cease-fire and peace accord," Mr. Sau said at a news conference.

### Saigon Denies Charges

He indicated that the Vietcong and Hanoi might place the accusations before the 12-nation International Conference on Guarantees set up for the Vietnam accords, which were signed in Paris Jan. 27.

The South Vietnamese delegation spokesman, Nguyen Trieu Dan, quickly rejected Mr. Sau's charges and issued a statement saying the Communists had committed 2,671 vio-

lations of the cease-fire between Jan. 28 and Feb. 12 and had forced South Vietnamese troops into defensive measures.

Mr. Dan said that the Vietcong and North Vietnamese had furnished only an incomplete list of 4,000 South Vietnamese prisoners of war of the 30,000 listed as missing, even though Saigon had provided the full list of its Communist prisoners. Neither has there been any mention of the 50,000 civil servants believed by Saigon to have been abducted by the Communists, Mr. Dan said.

### Hanoi Issues Statement

HANOI, North Vietnam, Feb. 12 (Agence France-Presse) — The North Vietnamese Foreign Ministry charged today in a press statement that the Saigon Government had violated the Paris agreements more than 2,000 times in 15 days.

The statement was not in the name of the spokesman as usual, but in that of the ministry itself. It said that Saigon authorities, "tolerated and shielded by the United States," had unleashed combined operations with ground, sea and air forces against regions under the control of the Provisional Revolutionary Government in South Vietnam.

"These acts show that the stubborn and bellicose Saigon administration continues a policy of force to oppose the peace," the statement said.
