his winter retreat at Key Biscayne, Fla., for a long weekend, stopped off at the Jacksonville Navy base to pick up
his daughter Julie and his sonin-law Lieut. David Eisenhower,
who serves on the guided-missile cruiser U.S.S. Albany,
qhich is based here. Mr. Nixon
toured the Albany while he
was here.

Mrs. Eisenhower was on
hand to greet her father when
he stepped from the Presidential jet, as was Mrs. Fredrick
Wright, whose husband, a
Navy lieutenant commander,
was killed in Vietnam.

"He was so elated that you
were re-elected," Mrs. Wright
told the President.
