House Halts Quest For Bombing Data

The House yesterday killed a move to require the Pentagon to furnish Congress with detailed information on the intensive December bombing of North Vietnam.

On a voice vote and without debate, members tabled a series of resolutions of inquiry, which the House Armed Services Committee had earlier unanimously rejected.

The resolutions sought to order Defense Secretary Elliott L. Richardson to inform Congress of the number of sorties flown, tonnage of bombs dropped, airplanes and men lost and the total cost of the bombing after peace negotiations broke down.

THE SENATE adopted a resolution that would allocate \$1 billion from the way Trust Funds to continue Interstate Highway

The committee report was sent to the floor for a vote, which is expected to be high.

employment was approved by a Senate labor subcommittee.

The measure is nearly identical to one approved by the full committee last year but was rewritten by the Senate Finance Committee and died for lack of action.

Congress adjourned. A House labor subcommittee is currently working on a bill which would provide for 10 years of full-time employment.

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
