Last group of POWs leave North Vietnam 27 Mar; POWs from earlier groups hold news conferences to tell for the first time of maltreatment and torture, 29 Mar; "Pueblo" shown on television the same evening.

Callers on KGO (ABC) talk show the following morning seem very much aroused by the show on the Pueblo and seem to have transferred their very strong reaction against the North Koreans, and their "recreated" treatment of the Pueblo crew, to the North Vietnamese, the link apparently being the news conferences of the POWs earlier the same day.
