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VIENTIANE, Laos, March 30 —The acting Defense Minister said today that there were growing indications that North Vietnam did not intend to withdraw its troops from Laos and might even be planning to seize more territory.

The official, Sisouk na Champassak, a leader of Laotian rightists who has been saying that the Feb. 22 cease-fire would not last, charged at a news conference that the 335th North Vietnamese Regiment had moved southeastward to threaten Government positions.

He said that the unit, along with trucks and other matériel, had traveled during the last three weeks from the Communist controlled Plaine des Jarres to southern Xieng Khouang Province. The advance seems intended to reach the Mekong River east of Paksane, he said.

Communists Building Road

The regiment, part of the 316th Division, is bearing down on Government positions at Tha

Thom and Ta Vieng some 20 miles southeast of the Plaine des Jarres, he said. The North Vietnamese are building a road from southern Laos toward Tha Thom, he added, and a new drive might be intended to seize the area to finish the road.

The official said that the Laotian Air Force would resume bombing of the situation deteriorate and Hanoi's troops continued advancing toward the Mekong.

Actually, non-Laotian military sources say, the bombing was never halted, merely reduced in scale after the cease-fire.

Asked if he intended to ask for American air support, Mr. Sisouk na Champassak replied that he would not.
