## Canada Charges Hanoi Sends More Troops South

SAIGON, South Vietnam, April 13 (AP) — Canada's peace-keeping delegation here charged today for the first time that North Vietnam was violating the Paris peace agreement by sending fresh troops into South Vietnam. Similar allegations were made by the United States:

Meanwhile, the South Vietnamese Government accused the Communists of 171 more cease-fire violations, the largest number in nearly a month, citing incidents around Hue, in northern South Vietnam, and near Bong Son, on the central coast.

In addition to the Canadian charges against North Vietnam, Michel Gauvin, the chief of the Canadian delegation to the International Commission of Con-

trol and Supervision, accused the Hungarian and Polish delegations of blocking an investigation of charges that the North Vietnamese had installed missile installations in the northwestern quadrant of South Vietnam.

### Downing of Copter Cited

Mr. Gauvin said at a meeting of the commission that North Vietnamese troops might have shot down a commission helicopter Saturday, and suggested that the aircraft might have been struck by a long-range surface-to-air missile. Nine persons were killed, including a Canadian, an Indonesian and two Hungarian members of the commission, two Vietcong liaison officers, and the crew of two Americans and a Filipino.

"Our duty to them," Mr. Gau-

vin said, "is to establish the true facts surrounding the incident which took the lives of our colleagues, to establish the truth as why they died and to find out who was responsible for their deaths. We shall not rest until we have answered these questions."

He did not mention North Vietnam by name, but officials said it was obvious that he was referring to North Vietnamese troops when he declared: "We have strong reason to believe that in other parts of South Vietnam, as well as in the area where the helicopter incident took place, non-South Vietnamese troops are stationed, or are infiltrating South Vietnam for the purpose of supporting militarily one of the two parties in South Vietnam."
