SAD NOTE on a spring morn: the Sausalito waterfront is about to lose its loveliest ornament, the 75-year-old gingerbread ferryboat, Berkeley — and to Southern California, at that. Bill Conover, who owns the boat and has operated the Trade Fair thereon for the past 15 years, revealed yesterday that the Berkeley has been bought by the San Diego Maritime Museum for delivery via a tow job next month.
