

Kissinger Sees End of Talks Soon

Presidential adviser Henry A. Kissinger said yesterday he believes one more round of negotiations in Paris could wrap up an agreement with Hanoi on strictly implementing the Vietnam cease-fire.

Kissinger, who returned last Wednesday from six days of meetings with Communist negotiator Le Duc Tho, told newsmen "significant progress" had been made in the talks.

"We reviewed the agreement very carefully," he said, "to see what could be done to bring about better implementation of those provisions which either side felt were not being carried out.

"We expect that when the discussions resume next week, we will conclude them satisfactorily," he said.

Kissinger declined to give any details, aside from saying the current round of talks would not change the provisions of the cease-fire accord which went into effect in January.

Kissinger expressed regret at the decision by the Canadian government to withdraw from the International Commission of Control and Supervision supervising the cease-fire agreement.

"We regret it especially at this time when we hope that out of the negotiations going on in Paris an agreement that can be implemented will emerge," Kissinger said. He is to return to Paris June 6.

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
