

U.S., North Viet Resume Paris Talks

Paris

American and North Vietnamese peace negotiators resumed talks yesterday on implementing the January 27 cease-fire agreement.

The secret talks between Henry A. Kissinger and Hanoi's Le Duc Tho are due to resume in Paris tomorrow.

Kissinger's deputy, William Sullivan, and Tho's deputy, Nguyen Co Thach, met for 5½ hours in a villa owned by the U.S. Embassy

on the outskirts of Paris, presumably in preparation for the Kissinger-Tho discussions.

Sullivan and Thach agreed to meet again today.

They had conferred for six hours Sunday and Thach indicated that the American bombing of Cambodia was a major point of disagreement.

The bombing continues, American officials said, because North Vietnamese troops are giving massive

support to the insurgent forces.

Kissinger and Tho held a week-long session last month and drew up a draft timetable for making the peace agreement effective in North and South Vietnam.

In Washington, the White House said presidential press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler will join the U.S. delegation going to Paris today.

A White House spokesman said President Nixon and

Kissinger asked Ziegler to attend the meetings to increase his understanding of this particular series of negotiations.

The spokesman was asked whether the fact Ziegler would be accompanying Kissinger meant Ziegler was getting broadened responsibilities on the Watergate-shaken White House staff. The spokesman replied: "Don't draw any conclusions."

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
