

# Jane Fonda Rebuke Killed

## Sacramento

A state Senate resolution condemning anti-war actress Jane Fonda for her criticism of American prisoners of war has been watered down to commend the former POWs without mentioning Miss Fonda by name.

Removal of the section censuring her came after a round of lobbying by Miss Fonda last week in the Capitol.

The lawmakers she visited included Senator George Zenovich (Dem-Fresno), a member of the rules committee, Senator Mervyn Dy-

mally, chairman of the Senate's Democratic Caucus, Senator George Moscone (Dem-S.F.), the Democratic floor leader in the Senate, and Senator John Stull (Rep-Leucadia), author of the anti-Fonda resolution.

"She wanted her name taken out of it," Stull said in an interview. "I told her the amended Stull resolution have the feeling the studio's putting some pressure on her."

As approved by the Senate Rules Committee yesterday, the amended Stull resolution welcomes and commends the returned POWs "for

their loyal service to this state and nation."

Originally, it had said:

"During the period of time many of these loyal men were suffering torture and barbarous treatment at the hands of their captors, a small group of well-fed, secure, pampered, privileged persons, including actress Jane Fonda, did visit North Vietnam and returned to this country to spread the lies of our enemy."

Stull said he was uncertain what he would do with the resolution now that Miss Fonda is out of it.
