Sihanouk Tells U.S. to Negotiate With the Cambodia Communists

PEKING, July 11 (Agence France-Presse — Prince Norodom Sihanouk, head of the Peking-based head of the Cambodian government in exile, warned here last night that President Nixon had only one "tiny door" through which to pull out of the Cambodia situation—direct negotiation with the Khmer Rouge, or Cambodian Communists if the Communists agreed to it.

In an interview, the Prince, who was ousted as Cambodia's Head of State in a coup three years ago, rejected "with scorn and disgust" and "in the name of the whole Cambodian resistance" negotiating proposals made last Friday by Foreign Minister Long Boret of the Phnom Penh Government.

Prince Sihanouk termed the proposals those of "cowards and traitors who sense that their hour has come and that they are to be hanged."

He has also said he would refuse to meet with President Nixon's national security adviser, Henry A. Kissinger, during Mr. Kissinger's forthcoming visit to Peking, or with any other American envoy.

The Prince Turthermore rejected suggestions that France or the Soviet Union might play part in settling the Cambodian problem.

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"It is now up to the Americans and the Cambodian Communists—the future masters of Cambodia to determine whether or not they want to hold talks," he said.

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
