Nixon Warms Congress on Bomb Cutoff

President Nixon, reaffirming that bombing in Cambodia will be stopped August 15, warned yesterday that the cut-off imposed by Congress could have "dangerous potential consequences" in Asia.

In congressional quarters, Mr. Nixon's letter addressed to Speaker of the House Carl Albert and Senate
Majority leader Mike Mansfield - was widely interpreted as
an attempt to shift onto Congress the blame and the
responsiblity if Cambodia should fall to the Communists after
the bombing halt.

Among the "dangerous potential consequences" of the congressional action, the President cited the difficulty of obtaining a cease-fire in Cambodia now that American bombing support is coming to an end.

"We have had every confidence of being able to achieve" a cease-fire in Cambodia, he said. "With the passage of the congressional act," he continued, "the incentive to negotiate a settlement in Cambodia has been undermined, and August 15 will accelerate this process."
