**Mansfield Sends Nixon
Sihanouk's Warning**

Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) said yesterday that he has sent President Nixon and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger copies of cables from Prince Norodom Sihanouk expressing fear of new U.S. bombing of insurgents in Cambodia.

Sihanouk, deposed as Cambodia's ruler in 1971, announced in Peking on Tuesday that he cabled Mansfield and Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.), appealing for their help.

In the cables Sihanouk charged: "The Lon Nol government in Phnom Penh will soon ask the U.S. government for the intervention of U.S. Air Force tactical and strategic planes in the Cambodian war again under the false pretext that the offensive by the armed forces of the National United Front of Cambodia of which I am the president is 'an aggression of North Vietnamese Communists and the Vietcong.'"

Administration officials in Washington disclaimed any knowledge or expectation of such a request. They noted that Kissinger has said the administration will comply with present legislation that bars any reintroduction of U.S. combat forces into Indochina without congressional approval.
