

Hanoi Aide, in Cuba, Says U.S. Infiltrates Soldiers in Disguise

HAVANA, March 27 (Reuters) —The North Vietnamese Premier, Pham Van Dong, has accused the United States of infiltrating soldiers dressed as civilians into South Vietnam.

The visiting leader told a rally here last night that the United States constantly violated accords with North Vietnam, and he called on Washington and Saigon to respect the 1973 Paris agreements putting an end to the Vietnam war.

Premier Fidel Castro pledged continued economic aid to North Vietnam for reconstruction. Cuba is believed to have provided annual sugar shipments.

Mr. Castro also promised to send more work brigades to the war-torn country. Some 500 Cubans are expected to build roads, schools and hospitals.

Mr. Dong, here for a week's visit, thanked Cuba for her aid, which he described as an authentic gesture of international solidarity. He said the reconstruction of his country would be a major contribution toward peace in Southeast Asia.

Mr. Castro, who said that humanity was indebted to North Vietnam for inflicting a resounding defeat to "Yankee imperialism," drew a parallel between Cuba and North Vietnam, saying both had to wage wars of liberation against two successive imperialisms.
