# ARMY TV WAR FILM IS REPORTED STAGED

WASHINGTON, May 22 — Senator J. W. Fulbright said today that the Senate Foreign Relations Committee had received sworn testimony from an Army sergeant that military television team in Vietnam had staged several combat incidents by South Vietnamese troops.

Protesting against such fakery" and propaganda," Senator Fulbright, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, sent a letter to Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird recommending that the Army television teams be abolished.

The testimony, according to Senator Fulbright, an Arkansas Democrat, came yesterday from a sergeant attached to one of the so-called "V-film teams" operated by the United States military assistance command in Vietnam. The teams make war films that are edited by the Army in the United States and supplied to commercial television stations and networks.

Jack Anderson, the columnist, reported meanwhile that a White House memorandum charged that the news department of the Columbia Broadcasting System had faked atrocity scenes in Vietnam on at least three occasions. The charge has been denied by Richard S. Salant, president of CBS news.

the press secretary insisted there was no White House involvement in making any charges against CBS news.
