

Art Schreiber, general manager of the station, said that the station had made available material that had been broadcast but that the request for material that had not been broadcast "raised serious First Amendment questions."

Tapes Demanded by Jury

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 20 (AP) — Jim Mitchell, a reporter for radio station KFWB, has been ordered by the county grand jury to produce tapes and notes of recent interviews he conducted related to bail bond practices.

He received a subpoena yesterday ordering him to appear before the grand jury tomorrow with the notes and tapes, regardless of whether the material was broadcast.

Meanwhile, another judge here rejected today the argument of three newsmen that the jailing of a fellow newsman, William T. Farr, for refusing to name a news source was an illegal expenditure of public funds.

Judge David A. Thomas of the Superior Court refused to issue a preliminary injunction sought by the newsmen. Mr. Farr has been imprisoned since Nov. 27 because of an article on the Charles Manson murder trial.
