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TV Newsmen**Assails****Nixon Aides****Washington**

Public TV newsmen Robert MacNeil yesterday accused the Nixon Administration of trying to turn public television into "a domestic Voice of America" which would broadcast "nothing but the Administration line."

The original congressional safeguards against political tampering with the system have been "subverted" by the White House, MacNeil charged. He said that public broadcasters are seeing "their dream being perverted before their eyes and their ideal of independence made a travesty by Mr. Nixon's appointees."

MacNeil, the senior correspondent for the National Public Affairs Center for television, which produces public affairs shows for public TV, made the charges in a speech to the Consumer Federation of America, meeting here.

MacNeil strongly criticized his new bosses: Nixon appointees Henry Loomis and Thomas B. Curtis, president and chairman of the board of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. Loomis has announced plans to de-emphasize public affairs programming on the network, and among the shows with uncertain futures as a result are two on which MacNeil appears: "Washington Week in Review" and "America '73."

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
