AUG 28 1971 SEChronicle Pro-Jackson Resolution Is Rejected

The San Mateo County Board of Supervisors officially rejected yesterday a resolution by the East Palo Alto Municipal Council that described last Saturday's death of George Jackson in San Quentin Prison as "summary execution" and "an act of genocide."

East Palo Alto is virtually all black.

The resolution, adopted Monday night by three members of the five-member council, described Jackson as a "revolutionary brother and a political prisoner."

The supervisors, who act for the council in county matters, dispatched a letter to the council yesterday, expressing the board's "disapproval" of the resolution, classifying it as "premature judgment."

The censure was voted by four of the five supervisors.

Jean Fassler abstained because, she said, she was not familiar with the text of the resolution.

The resolution declared: "It is utterly incredible that a prisoner in isolation in a maximum security facility could acquire and conceal possession of a gun as has been claimed by authorities.

"Be it known to all who hear or see these words that we, as leaders, citizens, brothers and sisters of the East-of-Bayshore community do hereby affirm our disgust and dismay at this atrocious act of genocide."

The resolution demanded "full complete and fair investigation" of the Jackson slaying and demanded "a redress of grievances . . . including the conviction and execution of all parties to this cowardly and criminal act." It also reaffirmed support of the "movement to free the Soledad brothers and all political prisoners in California and throughout the world."

The resolution made no mention of the death of five others during the Saturday breakout try — three guards and two inmates, all of them white.
