Expedite

The net result: Nelder will expedite an application in Mrs. Lipney's behalf to compensate her with State funds the difference between her regular wage of about \$140 a week and the \$87 a week she automatically will receive as workman's compensation.

The City is already responsible for her medical expenses stemming from the arm and shoulder wounds suffered when unknown gunmen blasted the station with shotguns and revolvers, killing Sgt. John V. Young.

Incredible

Alioto said he found it incredible that The City had no system of fully compensating employes who became the target of violence because of their work.

Personnel Manager George Grubb, meantime, moved to close this gap at the local level by drafting a change in City sick leave rules and a companion ordinance to cover future cases.

Grubb said the changes would be offered for adoption by the Civil Service Commission next Wednesday. The changes would provide full pay for City employes injured as a result of violence
