## Inmate Transfer imitation Dies

## Sacramento

The Senate Judiciary Committee yesterday killed a bill limiting the power of the state Department of Corrections to transfer an inmate from one prison to another.

The measure by Senator Anthony C. Beilenson (Dem-Beverly Hills) was defeated on a split voice vote after a department spokesman opposed it.

The measure would have required the department to conduct a hearing if an inmate objects to a transfer, unless the prisoner is a security risk or in need of medical aid.

It would also have prevented a transfer if the move

soner by interfering with his right to visit with his attorney or family .

But Walter Barkdull, deputy corrections director, said the measure eliminates the agency's "flexibility" in dealing with California's large prison population.

Carl Anderson, a lobbyist for the California Peace Officers Association and the District Attorney's Association, opposed the measure on the grounds it would "invite litigation."

"If a prisoner doesn't like a transfer, he's going to con-test it," Anderson said. "Where does he go, he goes to court."

But Beilenson said it was his intention only to prevent transfers that were "not puniworks a hardship on the pri- tively or unjustifiedly" or-

dered as a reprisal against an unruly inmate.

"We're just trying to impose minimal safeguards so we can treat these people as human beings," he said.
