Job Offer In Chicago For Angela

SAN JOSE — Angela Davis, out of work since she was fired from UCLA by the University of California Regents, has been offered a new job.

It would involve teaching at Chicago's Malcolm X College, a black community institution. Its president, Charles G. Hurst, hailed Miss Davis as a "very beautiful person" and said he made the offer through her parents.

At present, however, the only announced plans for Miss Davis include appearances in San Antonio, Tex., on June 15; in Chicago, June 17; in Detroit, June 18, and in New York City June 29 to thank her supporters.

Leaves Friday

The 28 year old black Communist, who was acquitted Sunday of any involvement in the August, 1970 Marin County Civic Center shootout, will leave Friday for Los Angeles before starting the nationwide tour.

She'll wind it up June 29 in Madison Square Garden. The "Evening With Angela," sponsored by the Angela Davis Legal Defense Fund, will include entertainment by Carmen McCrae, The Persuasions and other stars.

A spokesman, Stephanie Allan, said Miss Davis decided on the tour "to fulfill the responsibility of thanking those people who have worked for her freedom for the past two years."

Other Cities

Other cities, including her home town of Birmingham, Ala., may be added to the schedule.

After her New York appearance, she will go to Europe for a six-week vacation, perhaps in the Soviet Union.

Miss Allan said that when Miss Davis returns she will start "building a national defense organization for victims of repression."
