Tass Claims Ex-CIA Agent Has Defected

MOSCOW (AP) - A Soviet newspaper said today a for-mer agent for the U.S. Cenral Intelligence Agency from Quincy, Mass., identified as John Smith, has become a So-viet citizen and now lives and works in Moscow.

works in Moscow. The U.S. Embassy said it had never heard of him. The wekly newspaper Liter-ary Gazette has begun pub-lishing his story, Tass news agency reported before the paper itself was distributed.

A TASS summary said Smith served in the U.S. Navy, studied at Washington University and in 1950 went to work for the Department of State. It alleged that he did espionage work from the U.S. Embassy in New Delhi, India.

A "first installment" of the story claimed Smith spent his first 17 years in Quincy and was educated at Thayer Acad-emy in nearby Braintree, then worked at yards that manu-factured warships before vol-untoging for the New After unteering for the Navy. After studying at naval schools. Tass said, Smith was sent into permanent service at a special liaison department of the Navy, which was engaged in deciphering enemy codes. After the war, it said. Smith went to Washington University.

THE STORY went on: Smith was dispatched by the State Department to the U.S. Em-bassy in India for his first "m a jor espionage assign-ment" c a lle d "Operation Lighter."

Smith saw the light and begen to be critical of Amerigen to be critical of Ameri-can policy, came under sus-picion and had to leave the service. He lived in Austra-lia, Africa, Switzerland, Aus-tria and Italy before "at last he resolved to settled in the U.S.S.R."
