## Arends Defends C.I.A. Against Critics

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WASHINGTON, March 26—
Representative Leslie C. Arends of Illinois, the assistant Republican floor leader in the House, defended the Central Intelligence Agency today against its detractors.

He described as untrue or as "based on half-truths or distortions" published allegations that the actuary and b ca penetrated by Soviet intelligence.

He also assailed the published proposal of Representative John V. Lindsay, Republican of Manhattan, for the establishment of a new Congressional overseer for the C.I.A.

Mr. Arends, a member of the House Armed Services Committee, is a member of one of the subcommittees for the intelligence agency.

It is "quite understandable," Mr. Arends said that Soviet agents had in the ranks of the Soviet secret service, was quoted as having said that Soviet agents had in the ranks of the Congressional committee to supervise the Central Intelligence agency.

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"No one, except members of the Subcommittee itself, has any knowledge of just how extensively and intensively we inquire into the activities of this intelligence agency," Mr. Arends went on.

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
