## C.I.A. SAID TO CHARGE BOOK IS INACCURATE

Random House, publishers of an upcoming book on the Central Intelligence Agency, confirmed a report yesterday that the C.I.A. had contended parts of the book were inaccurate. The report was pointed in The

Minneapolis Tribune.

Bennett Cerf, the head of Random House, said the publishing concern had requested a list of the alleged inaccuracies in "The Invisible Government," by David Wise and Thomas B. Ross. Mr. Cerf said the request had been made three weeks ago and the C.I.A. had not yet re-

and the C.I.A. had not yet replied.

"We think the book is completely accurate," Mr. Cerf said. "If there are any inaccuracies, we'd certainly want to know about them. As yet, they haven't told us of one."

The book is to be published June 22.

Mr. Cerf denied that the C.I.A. had sought to suppress or censor the book. This, too, was reported by the Minneapolis paper.

"They suggested that it was somehow unpatriotic to publish the book," he said, "but there was never an effort to suppress it."

In Washington the C.I.A. declined to comment on the reports.
