WASHINGTON, July 23—
Desmond FitzGerald, a deputy director of the Central Intelligence Agency, died Sunday at the age of 57.

Mr. FitzGerald collapsed during a tennis match at his country residence at The Plains, Va., and died en route to the Fauquier County Hospital at Warrenton.

He had been an officer with the C.I.A. since 1951. An Esquire magazine article published in April, 1966, identified him as the man in charge of espionage activities abroad. An agency spokesman today declined to comment on that.

Mr. FitzGerald was a lawyer with the New York firm of Spence, Hopkins, Walser, Hotchkiss & Angell before joining the C.I.A.
