JAILED PUBLISHER **RELEASED BY SAIGON**

Special to The New York Times SAIGON, South Vietnam, Nov. 11—One of South Viet-nam's most widely known polit-ical prisoners, Nguyen Lau, a former newspaper publisher, was released from prison to-night after serving two years and seven months. His release, which had been promised for Oct. 31, was a re-sult of a decree by President Nguyen Van Thieu granting amnesty to 2,938 people, in-cluding prisoners of war and Vietcong suspects. Mr. Lau, who owned the English-language Saigon Daily News, was sentenced by a mil-itary court in July, 1969, to five years in prison for having contact with a Vietcong agent, Tran Ngoc Hien. Mr. Hien was later identified as the brother of an important Deputy Tran Ngoc Chau, who in February, 1970, was im-prisoned for also having had meetings with him. Some anti-Government poli-ticians said Mr. Lau's release might be intended by President Thieu to "calm public opinion" on the continued imprisonment of Deputy Chau. "The Supreme Court ruled last year that the military court that tried and sentenced Dep-uty Chau was unconstitutional and that his 10-year sentence should be annulled. But Presi-dent Thieu, who reportedly has great personal animosity to-ward Mr. Chau, ignored both rulings.

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
