Gen. Philip Strong, Expert on U-2, Dies

Brig. General Philip G Strong, who retired from the Pacific area, his duties included and earlier had participated in the development of the U-2 rec-paigns, 21 air-sea actions and onnaissance aircraft, died in Washington on Nov. 12. Gen-eral Strong, who was buried in Arlington Cemetery with full military honors, was 71 years old. He was an intelligence spe-cialist for the State Depart-ment and the Central Intellig ence Agency. For two years during World War II, General Strong was chief intelligence officer for the commander of battleships in the Pacific.
