U.S.-BONN TALK HELD ON 2 RADIO STATIONS

BONN, March 23 (AP) — Chancellor Willy Brandt's Gov-ernment said today that it was conferring with Washington on the future of Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty. The Government spokesman, Conrad Ahlers, said Bonn re-cognized the significance of the United States-financed stations in providing information to people in the Soviet bloc but wanted to avoid possible harm to West German foreign rela-tions.

Wanted to avoid potential to West German foreign rela-tions. He was commenting on a call for closing the stations made in messages to President Nixon and Chancellor Brandt by seven Social Democrats. The United States House of Representatives has voted funds for the stations, which are in Munich, through June 30. The bill has been sent to the Senate, where Senator J. W. Fulbright, chairman of the Foreign Rela-tions Committee, has been lead-ing a campaign against what he terms "relics of the cold war." The messages called on Mr.

war." The messages called on Mr. Nixon to halt the financing of the stations and to make their frequencies available to the Cologne-based Deutsche Welle station, which they said could provide "realistic reportage" to the Soviet bloc.
