MEXICO CITY, March 27-United States and Mexican officials announced today that 31-year-old John Patterson, a United States vice consul stationed in northwest Mexico, disappeared last Friday and was presumed kidnapped. 22

A spokesman at the United States Embassy here refused to disclose when or how the diplomat was seized or whether any ransom demands had been received.

"We just cannot go beyond this," he said. "It's a matter of the personal safety of the officer.

Mr. Patterson, who is married, has been assigned since January to the United States Consulate General in Hermosillo in the state of Sonora, 160 miles from the Arizona border. It is his first foreign post.

But a statement from the office of the Mexican Attorney General said that Mr. Patterson, a commercial officer, was last seen leaving the consulate Friday at about 10:30 A.M. in the company of an unidentified American. The statement said Continued on Page 6, Column 4
