

Made 'Discoveries' on Sub

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP) — Senator John O. Pastore, Democrat of Rhode Island, chairman of the Joint Atomic Energy Committee, said Tuesday that the Central Intelligence Agency "made some significant discoveries" last year when it raised part of a Soviet submarine from the floor of the Pacific Ocean.

Senator Pastore, who said his committee had been briefed on the agency's Project Jennifer, refused to elaborate. But his comments appeared to support recent news accounts that the crew of the Glomar Explorer succeeded in recovering two nuclear-tipped torpedoes and other valuable intelligence information from the sunken wreck.

William E. Colby, the Director of Central Intelligence, has told journalists in off-the-record briefings that the agency did not recover any of the nuclear weapons aboard the craft. He urged editors to withhold publication of the story so that the agency could make another attempt to recover the weapons without the Soviets' knowledge.

Mr. Pastore, who spoke to reporters before entering a closed session with Mr. Colby, said he would recommend that the deep-sea recovery vessel return to the wreckage site this summer to complete the operation.
