Watch on Waste-The Pentagon at last is getting serious about conserving energy. Common sense would dictate that saving energy should also save

money. But it is too much to expect common sense from the Pentagon. In the puzzle palace on the Potomac, you see, it costs to save. The military brass have

fully calculated that it will cost a cool \$107 million to save energy.

The Air Force has asked for \$47 million to conserve energy next year. The Army wants \$32 million, the Navy \$28.3 million. Other military agencies, including the supersecret National Security Agency, are asking for \$175,000 to save energy.

A Defense Department spokesman told us some of the money will be spent for search and development," some for reconverting heating plants.
