Agency is ending its association with all part-time correspondents affiliated with Ameritan news agencies abroad and individuals involved, news executives noted that the C.I.A. will no longer hire them as was casting doubt on the opera-agents, George Bush, Director tions of all news organizations

Mr. Bush reiterated to the National News Council representatives his refusal to dividuals who were working for or had worked for the C.I.A. Mr. Schnurman said, however, that C.I.A. officials had said that the agency was "terminating old arrangements in an orderly fashion and phasing them out." They refused to discuss how many journalists were involved.
