Lummis Named Chairman Board—His Law Partner Also Gets a Position

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. William Rice Lummis, 47 yers old, a Houston lawyer wh is a cousin of the late Howal R. Hughes, was named chainan of the board of the SummaCorporation today.

The corporation holds tile to almost all of Mr. Hughess estate, which has been estimated as worth more than \$1 Ellion. F.W. (Bill) Gay, prevously executive vice presiden was elected president and wil continue as chief executive officer and chairman of the executive committee of Summa.

The offices of president and board chairman were valant in Mr. Hughes's lifetime. Company spokesman had explained that the reason was so that Mr. ughes, the sole stockholder could fill the positions if he wished.

Mr. Lummis was one of three new members added to the Summa board, which was expanded from five members to eight. The two other new members are Milton M. West Jr., who has been Summa's tax counsel, and William E. Rankin, vice president and treasurer.

Mr. West, like Mr. Lummis, is a partner in the Houston law firm of Andrews, Kurth, Camp-

firm of Andrews, Kurth Camp-bell & Jones. Sources familiar with recent developments in Summa's affairs have pictured Mr. Lummis as relying heavil on Mr. West's advice.

Mr. Rankin is a longtime en ployee in Hughes enterprise having held positions will ughes Aircraft, Hughes Hel copter and Summa. Gay Issues Statement-C company spokesman attribute the rollowing statement to M.

"By these actions the repsentatives of the estate of Hoard Hugnes join with Summ's Management in reaffirming a policy of continuity for he daily operations of the corpra-

tion."
Mr. Lummis was quote as saying, "I will be as acti in affairs as I carfind company affairs as I carfind the time for."

The other four directs of Summa are holdovers, lik Mr. Gay. They are Chester C. Ivis, who will continue as hief counsel; Nadine Henley who will continue as senior vice will continue as seniorvice president, and John Holms and Lavar Mylar. Mr. Holms and Mr. Mylar were members of a six-man staff of "execute assistants" who traveled wh Mr. Hughes Hughes.

Mr. Lummis and Mr West will join Mr. Gay, Mr Davis and Miss Henley on the xecu-tive committee.

Directors Summon Margers

A company spokesm said that the director would spend the next two days disussing the current state of sfairs of the Hughes empire. The directors have asked the ranagers of the Hughes hotels and casinos to appear before them with reports and forecasts.

In the absense of a valid will Mr. Lummis came forward a the representative of his moth er, Mrs. Annette Gano Lummis, the 65-year-old aunt and closest surviving relative of the late Mr. Hughes.

With the backing of Summa executives, Mr. Lummis was designated by a Delaware court, where the company is chartered, as temporary administrator of Summa affairs. Thus, his assumption of a position of authorityz was not considered unusual.

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However, it is the view of observers that the naming of Mr. West to the board suggests a feeling among Mr. Hughes's turviving relatives that they need greater representation on the hoard

the board.
