WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Senator
Daniel K. Inouye, Democrat of Hawaii,
who is chairman of the Senate intelligence committee, said today that he had
ordered an investigation into allegations
that the Central Intelligence Agency conducted electronic surveillance against
lawyers negotitaing the future status of
Micronesia.

Micronesia, a group of islands in the
Southwest Pacific, is governed by the
United States under a United Nations
trusteeship. Legal questions have been
raised about the C.I.A.'s surveillance activities there.

The Justice Department reportedly is
concerned that the C.I.A. was eavesdropping on persons who may become American citizens.
