

U.S. FILES APPEAL ON EAVESDROPPING

CINCINNATI, Feb. 5 (AP)—The Justice Department asked the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit today to affirm the right of the Attorney General, acting without court permission, to order eavesdropping on persons suspected of activity contrary to the national interest.

A petition was filed seeking to enjoin Judge David Keith, of the Federal District Court in Detroit, from giving logs of recorded conversations to attorneys for Lawrence Plamondon, who is on trial there in connection with a bombing case.

The suit said that the Justice Department had turned the information over to Judge Keith on an appeal but that the release of the records was suspended until Feb. 9 pending action by the appeals court.

Mr. Plamondon is one of three men accused of conspiring to blow up a Central Intelligence office in Ann Arbor, Mich., in 1968.
