Wiretaps On Hoffman Ruled Illegal NOV 2 6 1971

A judge has ruled the government acted illegally in wiretapping four tele-phone conversations in-volving activist A b b i e Hoffman.

The Justice Department The Justice Department said the wiretaps were au-thorized for "national securi-ty" reasons by Attorney Gen-eral John N. Mitchell at the request of FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover. They were used to obtain an indictment against Hoffman on charges of ascaulting a police officer of assaulting a police officer and inciting a riot during the Mayday antiwar demonstra-tions here last spring.

U.S. District Court Judge John Lewis Smith Jr. said Wednesday the wiretaps vio-lated Hoffman's Fourth Amendment rights against unreasonable searches and seizures.

The result of the finding is that Hoffman must be al-lowed to see transcripts of the conversations two days before his trial. The Supreme Court still is to decide wheth-er similar wiretaps can be made without a court order.
