Life Fails in Bid to Be Alliluyeva Agent Abroad G

Life magazine's attempt to buy foreign publishing rights of the memoirs of Svetlana Alliluyeva, Stalin's daughter, has been unsuccessful.

The magazine's officials ended the negotiations yesterday after Mrs. Alliluyeva's lawyer, Edward S. Greenbaum, and his associate, Alan U. Schwartz, rejected two separate bids by the magazine to act as her agent in all foreign press serializations and in the sale of the book for overseas publication.

This is believed to be the largest price ever offered in Europe for a book and first serial rights—the right to sell a book or parts of it to other publications.

Subsequently, a joint bid totaling \$700,000 was said to have come from Paris Match of France, Stern of West Germany and Epoca of Italy, all maga-The magazine's officials ended for overseas publication.
