

I o Mrs. Alliluyeva Denouncing Exile Mrs. TIMES 223 (AP) -Svetlana Alliluyeva's son Iosif. disclosed today that he had sent her a letter denouncing her for having left the Soviet Union. "Yes, I criticized her for leaving this country," he said. "I told her I thought she was wrong in deciding to stay abroad. I said she had no rea-son to leave this country." "Excuse me, but I cannot tell you more about what I wrote," he said in an interview at the family apartment across the Moscow River from the Krem-lin. The 22-year-old son of Mrs.

Iamily apartment across the Moscow River from the Krem-lin. The 22-year-old son of Mrs. Alliluyeva, daughter of Stalin, said he sent the letter about a month ago, when she was still in Switzerland. "At that time I did not know she would go to the United States," he said. She arrived in New York on April 21, after having spent six weeks traveling in India and Switzerland. Her son said he had not received any reply or any information on her reac-tion to his letter. He added that he has not written her since. He told newsmen last month that he had spoken with his mother on the telephone about a week before she left Switzer-land and that she had not men-tioned plans to go to America. Iosif is the son of Mrs. Al-liluyeva and Grigory Morozov, a student whom she is reported to have married when she was 17, but later had to divorce on Stalin's orders. The son, his wife and his sister live in the family apartment in a big building containing apartments for Government officials.
