

Tells Veterans' Trial About Trip to Pick Marijuana

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—The Government's star wit-ness, William L. Lemmer, told the Gainesville Eight trial to-day that people he had known for only a few hours had of-fered him \$5,000 to drive his car on a weekend expedition to pick marijuana, that he turned in "one of my closest friends" for a bomb threat and that a teen-ager he had en-countered at a football bon-fire had announced that he planned to burn a campus land-mark.
